Reviewing Officer Wing Commander Jon Allen, BSc, MSc, MDS Royal Air Force



Wing Commander Jon Allen completed an undergraduate degree (BSc) in Environmental Geoscience at Brunel University in London before commissioning as a Navigator in 2005. He went on to operate the: Nimrod MR2 Maritime Patrol Aircraft, Rivet Joint RC-135 and Reaper MQ-9. Serving on operations in Afghanistan (Op HERRICK), Iraq (Op TELIC) and Syria (Op SHADER).

In 2014, Wg Cdr Allen was posted to the UK Joint Force Air Component as the Executive Officer for Current Operations (A₃). He went on to re-write the UK Air Operations Planning Course and to deliver Operational Planning training globally. His most notable 'live' operation in-role was a deployment as the sole UK planner for the short-notice hunt for over 300 abducted Nigerian schoolgirls (Op TAURUS).

In 2017, Wg Cdr Allen achieved a post-graduate degree (MSc) from the University of Portsmouth (UK) in Leadership and Management.

On promotion to Wing Commander in 2019, Allen was awarded command of Number 905 Expeditionary Air Wing; charged with the defence of the Falkland Islands in the South Atlantic. In addition to holding TACOM for four fast-jets, two cargo aircraft and four rotary assets; Allen commanded a battery of Army Air Defence Gunners. His role saw him appointed as the Aerodrome Operator for Mount Pleasant Airfield; responsible for all aviation safety.

Wg Cdr Allen graduated from the Joint Command and Staff Programme with the Canadian Forces College in 2022; attaining the Masters of Defence Studies (MDS) from the Royal Military College of Canada.

An enthusiastic but unaccomplished rock-climber, Wg Cdr Allen, along with his wife Jenny and daughters Isabelle and Bethany are embracing winter sports during their exchange posting to Canada.

A Brief Look At 142 Squadron

142 'Mimico' Squadron was chartered by the Air Cadet League of Canada on July 2nd, 1942 under the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Mimico. The old Mimico High School was the first Squadron Headquarters.

142 Mimico Squadron proudly displays the sphinx emblem and "Determination" motto of the historic No. 142 Squadron of the Royal Air Force, formed in Ismailia, Egypt, on February 2nd, 1918, as an army cooperation Squadron, then re-designated in 1934 under Bomber Command. During the Second World War 142 Squadron was equipped with Wellington and Mosquito aircraft, serving in the Middle East, North Africa, France and Italy. Like many Second World War Squadrons, 142 was disbanded following the Second World War, but its tradition of service and pride remains alive here in Mimico.

Over the years 142 has seen many changes, such as sponsor changes from the Lakeshore Board of Education to the Etobicoke Board of Education, to various Branches of the Royal Canadian Legion, from Branch 217, then Branch 3, and as of a couple of weeks ago Branch 643 as our sole public "sponsor".

Today's 142 'Mimico' Squadron is fortunate to have a Squadron Sponsoring Committee, a volunteer group of parents and former parents who represent the Air Cadet League of Canada and help co-ordinate various fundraising initiatives to pay for building accommodations and special activities not funded by DND.

Temporarily moving to Fort York Armoury in 2015, 142 'Mimico' Squadron began a close association with 32 Signal Regiment, Royal Canadian Corps of Signals (RCCS). At the Annual Ceremonial Review in 2016, the Regiment bestowed the honour of Affiliation upon 142 'Mimico' Squadron, thus bringing 142 into the RCCS family, a lineage that can be traced back 110 years in Toronto. This is a very special honour for 142 'Mimico' Squadron, and the Royal Canadian Air Cadets, as this is the first time in the history of the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals that an Air Cadet Squadron has become an Affiliated Unit.

Since July 1942, thousands young Canadians have benefited from Air Cadet training through their membership in 142 Mimico 'Determination' Squadron. Over the years countless 142 Cadets have been successful competing for flying scholarships, leading to earning their coveted pilot "wings", in both the glider and power programs. Additionally, hundreds have received advanced training in such other disciplines such as meteorology, aviation maintenance, leadership and wilderness survival instruction techniques.

In its 81 year history, 142 'Mimico' Squadron Cadets have many local, regional and national trophies, honors and awards as a Unit. Most coveted among these is the Lord Strathcona Trust Shield awarded to the most proficient Air Cadet Squadron in Ontario. Since the award's inception in 1947, Mimico Squadron has placed second 7 times and won it 10 times. It is a record of which we are justifiably proud and signifies a strong "Determination" to provide the finest youth training experience possible to the young people of the Mimico area.

Annual Awards

Lieutenant William F. May Memorial Trophy

Established in memory Lieutenant William May, a former Squadron Adjutant, presented to the "outstanding Level 1 Cadet of the training year" who has demonstrated the highest level of overall proficiency and dedication to the Cadet Program in all aspects of training.

William H. Bentley Award

Created by William Bentley in appreciation of what the Air Cadet program meant to his son. Presented annually to the "Junior Non-Commissioned Officer best displaying the qualities of leadership and cooperation towards others".

Lieutenant-Colonel W. Kenneth Robinson, CStJ, CD, QC, MP Award

Founded by the Late Lieutenant-Colonel The Honourable W. Kenneth Robinson while serving as the Member of Parliament for Toronto-Lakeshore, to recognize the value he placed in youth participation in the Canadian Cadet Organizations. Presented to the "Senior Non-Commissioned Officer best displaying the qualities of leadership and cooperation required towards others".

Major R.C. Leswick, CD, BA, Award For Best Flight Commander

Renamed in 2016 in memory a beloved Commanding Officer (2012 – 2015), this award recognizes the dedication and effort required of Squadron Flight Commanders, specifically recognizing the Flight Commander who "goes that extra mile" to support the Cadets within their Flight. This award embodies Major Leswick's spirit and personal commitment to the thousands of Cadets he served for four decades.

Determination Award

Created by 142 'Mimico' Squadron staff to recognize the Cadet who has demonstrated the highest level of "esprit de corps", as well as the "most personal initiative" to improve their personal drill, deportment and leadership skills throughout the training year. Hard work and dedication are the cornerstones of the Cadet program and this award is intended to recognize these qualities.

Major Rick C. Leswick Scholarship

The Late Major Leswick believed that post-secondary education was a key factor for young people to build their future on. Major Leswick dedicated much of his life in the service of the thousands of Cadets he mentored throughout his four decade career, and was always interested in their development as tomorrow's leaders. Dedicated to continue to help the Cadets he loved to serve, Major Leswick bequeathed this scholarship to be awarded annually to one Cadet "retiring" from the Squadron for post-secondary education. The recipient of this annual scholarship, in addition to moving on to post-secondary education, is someone who has demonstrated kindness towards their peers, is friendly, demonstrates leadership qualities and has a sense of humour, just like the namesake of this scholarship.

The Lord Strathcona Medal

The Lord Strathcona Medal is one of the highest awards that can be granted to a cadet. It demonstrates all that Lord Strathcona himself personified: hard work, dedication, service to Canada, excellence in all pursuits, vision, perseverance and intelligence and a focus on stewardship of our country; its health and vibrancy and that of its youth.

The recipient today has been singled out amongst their peers for outstanding performance as a cadet. For demonstrating proficiency in physical fitness and marksmanship, as well as dedication to the program and their country. For demonstrating the qualities of Lord Strathcona and leaving their own personal legacy at this squadron, and within the community through their service, performance, example and excellence as a cadet.

The Royal Canadian Legion Cadet Medal of Excellence

The Royal Canadian Legion Cadet Medal of Excellence (RCLCME) recognizes individual endeavours of a citizenship nature, which meet or enhance the purposes and objectives of the Cadet organizations. It is wholly sponsored and awarded by the Royal Canadian Legion.

Each Air Cadet Squadron may award one RCLCME each training year, provided a worthy candidate is available. The main theme in awarding the RCLCME is to emphasize the citizenship aspects of the Cadet program. The Squadron Commanding Officer is the approving authority for the award of the medal, but he is encouraged to seek the active participation of the local Legion authorities.

Squadron Leader Les Waterfield, DFC, CD, Cadet Of The Year Award

Established in 1974, this award is presented to the Cadet displaying an exceptional contribution to Squadron training activities. Recognizing the dedication of Squadron Leader Waterfield who served as the Royal Canadian Legion's Liaison Officer to 142 Squadron for over 20 years. A Second World War Veteran, Sqn Ldr Waterfield enlisted in the RCAF in December 1940. Serving in Ceylon (Sri Lanka) for most of the war, patrolling for enemy submarines in the South East Asia theatre of operations, he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for "An act or acts of valour, courage or devotion to duty whilst flying in active operations against the enemy". Sqn Ldr Waterfield was on his way back to Canada to join an elite Tiger Force to be deployed in the Pacific when peace was declared. In 1950, Sqn Ldr Waterfield joined the RCAF Auxiliary with #2400 Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, rising to the appointment of Commanding Officer.
